

Carla's Comments

I wonder how we will remember 2020, if the Lord allows us to look back on it? It seems the plans of every single person on the planet ground to a halt. For some, "stay at home" is not much different than normal, but for most others it has been quite an adjustment—and a huge trial with emotional, financial, and spiritual implications. These trials can really expose our weaknesses, I think...and they open the door for the devil to tempt us. Frustration, anxiety, anger and even boredom can push us to say and do

things we may not ordinarily say or do. But trials will also (if we are intentional to look for opportunities) push us to grow in our patience and help us learn to trust God more. I think we can also push ourselves to see the lessons, and ask for opportunities to serve, and look for the good things that will come from this. I'm not minimizing the tragedy that many are going through. But for me, personally, I am thankful for a slower pace. I'm thankful to have more time to meditate on God's word - not just read it, but truly **soak** in it. I'm glad for time to spend outside clearing cedar and getting exercise (and thankful that we have an outside to go to!) I'm thankful for more careful meal planning. I'm even thankful that we've been made to see that we shouldn't take groceries for granted! I'm grateful for old memories popping up in my head of both of my grandmothers: having both been through hard times, they were careful not to waste anything. Mom is the same way, and I'm relearning those lessons. I'm thankful for being confronted with unfinished projects and goals along with being given the time I've always said I didn't have to finish them (I'll "say" it out loud again for a little accountability's sake: BOOK. I'm working on it.) (Still scared.) I'm glad to have more time with our parents. I'm thankful to be shown how long a day can be for those who are "shut in". I'm thankful to know I will cherish any kind of inperson fellowship even more when this is over. I'm thankful I got a good haircut right before this started. I'm thankful for technology - Zoom and Facetime and email and Facebook - all of it keeps us from being completely cut off from friends and family. And if you think about it, those Zoom chats are cheaper, simpler, and easier than going out to dinner with friends...so I'm thankful to be reminded that friendship can still blossom even when we're not face-to-face. But I'm also thankful that we won't take those dinners out with friends for granted when they return. I'm really thankful that John and I enjoy being together. That's a short list of things I'm thankful for - but most of all I'm thankful to know that no matter what, even if we never go back to what we considered normal...even if this changes life forever...even if "the worst" happens, I have a sure and steadfast hope of something far brighter and better than this life, and it is being prepared for me! And I am thankful that this pandemic has turned more thoughts in HIS direction. We traveled home from Denver on April 2. I was nervous we wouldn't be able to find open, clean bathrooms on our 14+ hour trip - but it was all fine.
