At other times you have to push your way through the melee to the light of day. In the process, you often hear brief bits and pieces of the conversations of others. Sometimes, it is a tour guide informing his followers, or perhaps a local businessman bargaining with a shopper. What I heard most recently has continued to reverberate in my ears, and has deeply touched my heart. It came from young woman who remarked to her companions that she could easily disprove Christianity. Those were the only words I heard as we quickly passed each other: she heading toward the Armenian Quarter, while Carla and I made our way down to the Jewish Quarter. I don't know if she was non-religious, a Jew, or a skeptic, but I wish I would have had the presence of mind to turn around and politely ask her, "How?"

The remark, "I can easily disprove Christianity," was a clear reminder that the Bible is under attack. The value and importance of defending the faith and redeeming the lost cannot be understated. Our fallen world with its doubters, skeptics and non-believers need to see the plethora of evidence for the inerrancy of scripture and the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Being in Israel for

most of July enabled us to continue to study, analyze and document many of the archaeological and geographical evidences which reveal the verity of scripture. It's essential for the world to see that the Christian faith is valid, and that its historical context is verifiable. Likewise, the New Testament writers and their testimony concerning Jesus must be demonstrated to be reliable and credible. Bible Passages is committed to this goal.

The video and photographic evidence we amassed included drone footage at 19 sites. We were privileged to film at places like Caesarea Maritima, Gezer, Azekah, Bethsaida, the Jordan River, the Sea of Galilee, Libnah, Gath, and

Lachish. We also completed the goal of documenting the existence of seven proposed first-century synagogues. We will have more about this soon, but in the past, skeptics have suggested that the Bible was inaccurate because it stated that synagogues existed during the time of Christ. This documentation and research, along with our participation in an archaeological dig at Tel Burna (proposed biblical Libnah) has given us much to do as we continue our work on the Bible Land Passages videos. Cataloging, describing, and writing about many of these place will continue to be a lifelong process as well.



Getting to preach one Sunday was an added blessing, but meeting with Christians in their home was the greatest blessing of all as we discussed the work of the church, the future of Israel, and the need for two of their guests that day to put on their Lord in baptism.

Other works throughout the month have included premarital counseling sessions with a soon-to-be-married couple, recording and editing work at World Video Bible School, and preparations for our work at Bear Valley Bible Institute. We are now back in Denver, and looking forward to the start of another great year with 40 full-time students. God continues to bless us with so many things to do and we are grateful to give you a small taste of what all has been happening. As we continue our work we covet your prayers, but likewise want you to know how deeply appreciative we are for your support and love.
